- My role is also to motivate and organize joint handball functions, such as the league and fun days. Our Sacramento Open tournament is the biggest function. I feel it is well entrenched and in good shape. Dave Thoreson and Ron Domingos have been the go-to guys for that result.

- Our league is a work in progress. The changes made for this current season seem to be well received. However adjustments are always an option to get more participation and enjoyment from the league.

- Youth program. Handball is still healthy but getting quite old. We need to promote young players however we can. Besides just communicating this we need 2 pieces to complete the puzzle. We need a place to provide supervised lessons, and we need personnel to do the instruction. I foresee SAHA providing the equipment (*with help from the USHA*) and instructors. I hope to get a commitment from one of our clubs to provide free court time on a scheduled basis. Any ideas along this line will be well received. Call Tom Bridges at 383-1262.

- ON THE MEND -

- WAYNE'S WAY -

Wayne's Way was recently posed the interesting question, "why do we have seeding for tournaments?" The query seemed simple enough, but then what appeared to be a rudimentary answer started twisting and turning into a great ball of confusion. This happens a lot here at Wayne's Way and of course we do it so well. Initially, you would most likely say that the two best players would then most certainly meet in the finals and be rewarded for hard work and previous championship efforts. Let's delve into ten new ways to decide who plays whom.

Why ten new ways you ask? We didn't believe we could come up with a dozen without getting too stupid or silly, but if it goes well, Wayne's Way may have couple more as a bonus for you dozen-people.

1. First application received by the tournament director is the numero uno seedo, (*Wayne's Way staff is multilingual*). Wayne's Way can envision money flying thru the mail at light speed to the director of event operations. They may send dollars a year in advance to be able to brag to their buddies that they were the number one seed in the big tournament. If you had been the final seed in the draw this would provide no advantage for match longevity. You would just probably lose to any other entrant, but not get blown out as bad as if you had played the top seed.
2. This is the 1 vs. 2, 3 vs 4, 5 vs 6 etc. scenario. Big advantages can be spied here. Everyone is usually at the tournament the first day, and would therefore get to see all the best matchups. 1 playing 2 would have an overflow capacity crowd and no one would be hungover yet. Let's say number 2 beats 1. Number 1 would then get to go about his weekend and possibly save his marriage (*again*) by coming home early from the event.
3. How about the lottery seeding system? Tournament director would simply draw your check number out of the hat and seed accordingly to the first drawn. Pluses are again painfully evident when dealing with average handball entrant, (*especially the perennially late check sending primadonnas*), no checkie no playie. Number one seed hotshots will probably just xerox a copy of a check and send to numerous tournaments to try and keep options open 'til the last minute.
4. Worst player in the tournament will arrange the draw. He can then stick it to everyone that has pitted him against the number one seed every time. Let revenge reign! Hey wait, we already have this system in place now at many tournaments.
5. The dart throw draw. You can either throw darts at check numbers or photos if handy. By the way, the Wayne's Way staff dartboard has worn out its last Dave Thoreson and Tom Bridges photos. Please forward additional photos to WW staff.
6. The guy we'd like to NOT see around for the rest of the weekend draw. This one is simple, no one likes player X, he plays the #1 seed, and preferably on Friday afternoon. If the draw is a dropdown format, make sure this person gets a bye the first round. You'll only see them on Saturday for a short stint.
7. The guy we'd like to see around for the rest of the weekend draw. This is a trick seeding question. There aren't any of these people we would like to see that much.
8. The idea for a tournament has been bantered around lately. Matches that we would like to see played, like grudge games, dream matchups, or games between two people that have never played against each other but are always saying that they could beat this person. Add a section to the tournament entry form that would allow anyone to request the perfect matchup, and seed this match in the first round.
9. Have the neighbor's wife or 8 year child do the seedings. No one at the tournament would then be responsible for ruining your weekend.
10. Put the top two people against each other in the first round. Hey, spread the hardware wealth. Let the rest of the crowd have a shot at winning a really nice .25 cent digital clock glued on to an L-shaped hunk of plastic (*.10 cents*) to go along with the T-shirt that has the next Mission Impossible mission written on it. We put too much effort in this last one, and don't have any more.

John Harold (Jack) Tone III

May 13, 1909 - January 5, 2007
Stockton, CA

A great man has gone to his reward on Friday, January 5, 2007. Jack Tone was born, passed on and will remain forever at his beloved home, Jack Tone Ranch.

Bud was an outstanding rancher and leader in his community. With Marge's help, incredible work and dedication, they transformed Jack Tone Ranch into a modern 20th century farm and world famous Arabian horse ranch. A great athlete, Bud was inducted into the Northern California Handball Association (NCHA) Hall of Fame (1984) and the Stockton Athletic Hall of Fame (2003) for his skill and sportsmanship. Jack Tone served 4 terms as Director, President and Vice-President of Stockton-East Water District (SEWD). Bud was an untiring advocate for farmers and instrumental in establishing local water policy. Everything Bud had, he gave freely and graciously to his family and friends. He spoiled us with pure love and so much fun. We can't remember a time spent with Bud when we had anything but Fun! We miss his humor, heart, friendship, intelligence, character and soul. We'll see Bud again someday, God Willing. He was preceded in death by his parents; brothers; sisters and son. Jack (Bud) Tone was crazy in love with Marjory for more than 75 years. They were married September 5, 1932, with 5 daughters; a son; 15 grandchildren; 22 great-grandchildren and 1 great-great-grandchild.

I am still working with the Blind Vendors who lease and run 9 retail stores and the vending machines at the Honolulu Interbational Airport. Since retiring in 1993 after 33 years of State service I worked one year for the State of Hawaii and the next 12 years at this company. It has been great to work in private for profit type business. I am the HR Manager for a company of about 80 people and the owners and the business has been great to work for. Although I stopped playing handball since 4 years ago I manage to play racquetball a few time a year. Although it isn't handball it is easier to find players. I still get to beat them up in the court so I'm happy although I am thinking about checking out the YMCA again to see if I can get back into handball again. The problem here is that everyone seems to be locked into partners and certain times for play which doesn't matchup with my excercise time. My weight is down and I do 24 hr fitness 3-4 times a week but I still miss h-ball, especially my right hand kill shots and my serves. Will let you know if and what happens on my re-entry to h-ball. I'll be in Sacto on the 24th to the 30th of May at my son Chris' place in Elk Grove. Hope to see you guys at aninal hour at Carmichael on Sunday. Aloha."

Norm Duroff: Old Elks and Carmichael. Norm tells us "For the past three years I have been living and working as a Realtor in Sun City Roseville. We do have a fitness center here, but no handball courts. I sure do miss the game and all the guys. Handball players are a special breed! "The best"!!!"

Mike Achziger: Carmichael. Mike says "I moved my CPA practice to Citrus Heights, and have managed to eliminate my I-80 commute. My wife and I are getting our family house in Rocklin ready to sell, and plan on moving to Sun City in Roseville. I still work out frequently, but usually go to the Wenmat Roseville club (the old Kangaroo Courts). Golf is my primary hobby, and I play two or three times a week at Sierra View. I can't tell you how much I miss handball, and the comaraderie with all of the great guys".

Dave Parker: Carmichael. From Dave we learn “I Moved to Fresno in 1994. I’m still in the fruit business, now working with Fruit Patch, the biggest shipper of fresh peaches, nectarines and plums in the industry. We also ship quite a few fresh grapes. About 12 million boxes total. Been here three and a half years. When we moved to Fresno I was the marketing director for North America representing all the peach, nectarine and plum growers in California. With Fruit Patch I’m still covering North America but I’m also getting around to Asia and Latin America. Sadly, no handball for a few years because of shoulder injury (not handball related), but still work out almost daily. Always good to get your updates!”

Karl (Gus) Gustafson: Gus tells us “I’m currently a member of the Laguna Creek Racquet Club (LCRC) and have had to resort to playing racquetball because there are no other handball players. Hopefully, Jerry Pelfanio, whose also a member of LCRC, will be able to start playing again fairly soon. If so, I’ll start playing him during the week and at Carmichael on Sunday mornings. If not, I’ll probably quit LCRC and go back to WENMAT--and start playing at Alhambra.”

Frank Walter: Old Elks and Carmichael. Never at a loss for words, the Spider writes “Thanks, Tom, for the inquiry. OK, update: I had knee replacement surgery, both, at Northwestern Medical Center in Chicago in the fall of 2005 (Sept.). Jo Ann and I were headed for Bulgaria (we just couldn’t handle the Bush’s armed aggression against an innocent people anymore), but after my recovery, Jo Ann decided (she’s the “decider”) to return to her former hometown Portland, Oregon. We returned to Portland in March to look for a place to squat and finally found one in December. Right now I am in the process of remodeling. I tried to play handball for a few months (the doc said doubles in tennis would be OK since he didn’t know anything about handball--the world’s greatest game with the finest people playing). I tried but bionic knees limit mobility and don’t seem to work too well. I was half speed with two bad wheels before surgery as you remember when we played at Carmichael; after surgery it was put up stakes to see if the Spider was moving time. I guess playing handball for forty years takes a toll on the ol’ bod, but I’m 79 and maybe that has something to do with my playing. What do you think? Spider”

Guy Hoover: Elks. A third shoulder surgery finally made an improvement for Guy. He is playing again but not near the skill level he once was. Guy retired about 2 - 3 years ago and built a home in Coarse Gold (foothills above Fresno).

Chuck Fishbourne: Capital. Chuck retired and moved to Hemet in Southern California. Still plays handball there.

Joe Kovacs: Alhambra. Joe stopped playing handball due to chronic knee problems. He still works out almost daily at Alhambra and is in excellent physical shape. Athletic passions now are biking and rock climbing.

Lou Vistali: Capital. Lou and wife moved up to El Dorado Hills. Handball status unknown.

Joe Pearce: Elks, Carmichael, Alhambra, Turn Verein. Joe had knee replacement surgery a few years ago, but it has never quite been the same. Can’t play handball due to chronic swelling and can’t watch handball because it kills him to not be playing. But still active in volunteer work (including the reason you’re reading this newsletter).

Sam Peruch: Old Elks, Carmichael. 83 year old Sam still gets on the handball court several times a week. But not to play, he runs around the court for exercise and throws the ball to work on his coordination. Cub Eldridge, Lance Klug and Bruce Anderson have invited him to join them but Sammy just says (like always), “I hate doubles”.

Rostik Storozuk: Gold River, Carmichael. There was a Rostik sighting a few weeks ago at Carmichael. But he is not playing handball now. Needs a hip replacement.

Mike Bossert: Carmichael, Gold River. The Math Man writes “Thanks for keeping in touch. I’m not an “old player,” but rather a former player. When we moved here in 2000, after retiring from CSUS, I had hoped to continue playing handball. There were few local players so I tried some racquetball for a while. My left ankle was causing more problems (due to too many years of playing with low-cut shoes) and so I gradually gave it all up. In June of 2004 I had symptoms leading to a “Whipple” procedure in August to remove a cancerous growth

blocking my bile duct & pancreatic duct. In March of 2005 a periodic blood test found something had taken off again. I spent 5 months on chemotherapy before it started to lose effectiveness. I was lucky to get on a trial program for “oxaliplatin” from Oct. through March of 2006. It was very effective and I have been off chemo for 11 months now. I do take a really expensive drug called Sutent, luckily covered by my CA insurance. I currently get a blood test every 6 weeks and see my oncologist every 12 weeks. My weight is back to about 198 after being down to 182 at one point. I feel better each day and wish I could see my CA friends more often. Best wishes to all..”. Mike

Rick Mares: Carmichael. Moved to Southern California over 10 years ago, and now to Las Vegas. Is a superintendent for a construction company. Still plays handball regularly.

Jim Flood: Old Elks, Carmichael. This former NCAA boxing champion still visits Carmichael almost daily. Works out on machines. Tried to make a short lived comeback to handball, but his long term leg problems wouldn't allow it.

Bud Lanigan: Old Elks, Carmichael, Gold River: Bud had knee replacement surgery . Tried to make a handball comeback but it was not to be. Visits Carmichael regularly to work out and stay in great shape.

Nick Laplaca: Old Elks, Carmichael, Riverside. Works out hard daily at Riverside. No handball, but like to keep in touch with all of us.

Carl Von Cleff: Old Elks, Carmichael. No more handball, but works out regularly at Carmichael. Also part of the legendary Pinochle Group playing 2 -3 times a week upstairs.

Pete Revello: Old Elks, Carmichael. No more handball, but another who works out often at Carmichael. 2nd member of the Pinochle Group.

- LEAGUE'S NEW FORMAT APPEARS POPULAR -

A format drafted after the popular Bay Counties League was adopted this year. The change was made in an effort to inject some new enthusiasm in our SAHA league. Judging by the participation after the first round, it appears to be working. Instead of biweekly matches between 2 teams the new plan has 4 teams playing a round robin on 2 separate half days of competition.
